1. Letter received by George Glann of 4440 North Creek Road, requesting the town board to consider a speed reduction past his house, due to the "blind" driveway that limits his vision from oncoming traffic. Although there are yellow caution signs, drivers do not obey them. He also attached a photograph of an flipped car with the caption "The view from our front yard." The letter was referred to the Highway Traffic Safety Committee for their recommendation.

- Letter was received from Time Warner Cable updating us on changes in the Government and Public Affairs Department at Tine Warner Cable. Chris Mueller has joined them as Manager of Government Affairs.
- 3. From New York State Public Service Commission, we received a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (Case 01-V-0381) "In the Matter of the Rules and Regulations of the Public Service Commission Regarding Cable Television, issued February 18, 2003. A copy of the complete 98-page document is on file in the Town Clerk's office.

"NOTICE is hereby given that the Commission is considering renumbering cable television regulations in Title 9 NYCRR Subtitle R as Title 16 NYCRR Chapter VIII, Cable Television.

"9 NYCRR Parts 589 through 590.59, 591, 592-2, 593, 597, 599.10, 599.20 (a), 599.20 (c) (1), 599.21 (a) (1) and (2), 599.30 through 599.40 and 599.84 are deleted. 9NYCRR Parts 590.60 through 599 are renumbered as 16 NYCRR Parts 890.60 through 899. The rules eliminate duplicative procedural rules and streamline the remaining cable television rules. Franchise periods may be extended from ten to 15 years under the rules. Some filing and notice requirements are reduced. The rules are proposed to become effective immediately upon publication of a Notice of Adoption in the State Register, the earliest date permitted by law.

What is Communities That Care (CTC)?

Communities that Care (CTC) is a five-step comprehensive prevention approach that provides research-based tools to help communities identify and address risk and protective factors associated with substance abuse, delinquency, teen pregnancy, school dropout and violence. It was developed by researchers at the University of Washington and is based on research from a

"COMMUNITIES THAT CARE" REQUEST FOR TOWN BOARD SUPPORT variety of fields (sociology, psychology, education, public health and criminology, etc.)

CTC includes all sectors of the community (families, schools, health care, mental health, law enforcement, business, etc.) and takes a pro-active, data-driven approach to identify areas needing intervention. Each community develops its own unique profile and action plan specific to their local needs.

The training needed to implement CTC occurs in 5 phases:

- I. Get started—forming a core workgroup of key citizens.
- II. Get organized—engaging key stakeholders, developing a partnership board or organization.
- III. Developing a profile of community strengths and challenges; collect data, inventory resources, identify over lap or gaps, analyze data and prioritize areas of focus.
- IV. Creating a comprehensive youth plan—define desired outcomes, select proven effective programs, plan to implement programs and strategies, plan for evaluation.
- V. Implementing and evaluating the plan.

The Social Development Strategy is the theory that supports the research framework for Communities That Care, which guides communities toward their version of positive development for youth. The strategy begins with the goal of healthy, positive behaviors for young people by immersing them in environments that:

- Consistently communicate healthy beliefs and clear standards.
- Develop strong bonds to their families, schools and communities.
- Provide opportunities for meaningful youth involvement.
- Develop skills for successful involvement.
- Provide opportunities for recognition.

"Your support is vital to the success of this initiative. As a key leader, you would be asked to attend an initial program to kick off this initiative. You or your designated representative could be involved in subsequent trainings, meetings or the partnership board."

COUNCILMAN LAMBRIX TO REPRESENT TOWN OF PALMYRA Councilman Michael Lambrix indicated to the town board that he would be interested in participating in this group. He completed the paperwork to be sent to the Community Services Board. His fellow board members were in agreement with his participation in the group.

5. Facsimile transmission was received from Barry Schwartz, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel of the City of New York, addressed to David Lyon, Supervisor. Excerpts from the message include:

"I am writing to hopefully enlist your town's support of Bill S.622/A.3483, which is sponsored by Senator Volker, and Assembly members Weisenberg and Sidikman, respectively. If enacted, that Bill, a similar version of which has been included in the Governor's Executive Budget, will be of great financial benefit to public employers and it therefore already has the support of a 190-member coalition (including the State Attorney General). This is because the Bill would eliminate the current unintended inequity in CPLR 4545 under which the public employer—when sued by one of its employees—is now the sole defendant which is not entitled in tort actions to a reduction of future lost earnings awards for disability pensions, etc., that are meant to serve the same purpose as such awards. Irrespective of whether you are affected by the Bill, we still greatly hope that you will come on board as well, at the very least in the interest of assisting those public employers who are financially harmed by the present windfall allowed by CPLR 454r which the Bill would rectify."

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Highway Committee - Michael Lambrix, Chair

Nelson Cook, Town and Village Highway Superintendent, submitted a Highway Snow Report as of 2/27/03, showing that expenses this year for overtime hours are more than double what was budgeted. In all cases, expenses were up, and the amount of sand and salt used in the plow runs leaves very little in reserve. He hopes the brunt of the season is behind us now. The Highway crew is currently servicing equipment, repairing, and getting out Spring equipment.

Councilman Lambrix commended the Highway Department for the good job they've done in our town, comparing it to what he has seen in other towns. Lambrix said he would be glad to tell them personally.

Planning Committee – James Welch, Chair

Councilman Welch asked about the Revised Map of the Palmyra Master Plan and where the Master Plan project was. Supervisor Lyon stated that we had received a quote from Stuart Brown Associates and it was forwarded to the village. We are now awaiting their reply.

Zoning Committee - David Nussbaumer, Chair

 CEO Update for February 2003 submitted by Bob Grier, so noted as received and filed. Grier's office is reviewing old zoning maps, catching up on all files. The new software has been installed and will be getting instruction in March in its application and use in the field and interfacing with PC system.

Grier also reported that there were two fires this month—one on Main Street and one on Parker Rd. at a newly-constructed home. He had been called to both locations to determine safety of the structures.

Phase 6 of the Sorensen subdivision on Division St. has been approved. It calls for five buildings of 1-, 2-, and 3-bedroom units, as well as a community center building. With anticipated State and Federal financing, construction is expected to start in the Fall.

As an informational item, an offer has been made on the old Garlock Building at the corner of Church and Canal Streets to renovate it into Senior Citizens' apartments plus additional apartments in the future.

Ed Wheeler participated in the Time Warner Cable Company meeting at Wayne Central School and says they plan on adding 20 cents per month to each bill to cover expenses and to upgrade equipment. 2. The board reviewed the SEQR form for Infinity Solutions' Special Use application. The motion was made by David Nussbaumer to approve the special use authorization with the stipulations that Dale Roberts would meet town zoning codes and normal list of special use conditions, the conditions he stated on the application for his hours of operation, and that there be no parking along Route 31. WHEREAS, on the 27th of February, 2003, a Public hearing was held by the Town Board of Palmyra at 7:30 PM at 1180 Canandaigua Road, Palmyra, Wayne County, New York to consider the application of David S. Roberts and Dale S. Roberts, d/b/a Infinity Solutions, at 5012 Route 31, Palmyra, (Roger Wilson, property owner), for Special Authorization to operate a used vehicles display and sales facility.

ORDER TOWN BOARD SCHEDULING PUBLIC HEARING ON THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE HYDESVILLE WATER DISTRICT

A map, plan and report have been prepared in a manner and detail as determined by the Town Board of the Town of Palmyra, regarding the establishment of a proposed Water District in the eastern area of the Town.

The map, plan and report have been filed in the Town Clerk's Office in the Town.

The map, plan and report were prepared by MRB Group, P.C., a competent engineer, licensed by the State of New York, showing the boundaries of the proposed Hydesville Water District, a general plan of the water system and a report of the proposed methods of operation.

The map shows the course and distances and proposed size of the transmission lines, together with the location and a general description of all public works required, including lands and easements to be acquired.

The boundaries of the proposed district are all as shown on Schedule "A" attached hereto and made a part hereof.

The improvements proposed are as follows:

Installation of 8,600 feet of 12" watermain and 2,200 feet of 6" watermain with hydrants, taps, valves, etc.

The proposed method of financing the costs of the improvement consists of the issuance of serial bonds of the Town to mature in annual installments over a period not exceeding 38 years, payable in the first instance from assessments levied on benefited real property in the proposed Extension to the Central Water District.

The maximum amount proposed to be expended for the improvement and for the acquisition of the necessary lands and easements is \$434,600. The Town will apply for a Small Cities Grant and a Rural Development Grant which the Town believes it is eligible to receive.

The proposed expense for the average single-family residence in the district is \$583 per year (includes average cost of water consumption). In addition, the average single-family residence shall pay an installation charge of \$1,250. All residences connected thereafter shall pay a connection charge as established by the Town from time to time.

The map, plan and report describing the improvement are on file in the Town Clerk's Office for public inspection.

This Board will hold a public hearing to consider the map, plan and report on March 27, 2003 at 7:30 P.M. at the Palmyra Town Hall, 1180 Canandaigua Road in the Town of Palmyra, New York.

This Order shall take effect immediately.

COOPERATION AGREEMENT By and Between THE TOWN OF ARCADIA AND THE TOWN OF PALMYRA

THIS AGREEMENT, made this 11th day of March, 2003, by and between the Town of Arcadia and the Town of Palmyra, municipal corporations situate in the County of Wayne and State of New York (hereinafter referred to collectively as the "Towns"),

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the 1974 Housing and Community development Act, as amended, established the Small Cities Community Development Block Grant Program and pursuant to that program makes funds available to municipalities on a competitive basis to address their housing and community development needs; and

WHEREAS, the Towns share common community development problems, needs and objectives and would like to receive federal funding to effectively solve existing water supply problems in the area; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the Towns to cooperate with each other and to develop and file a joint application for Small Cities Community Development Block Grant funds for Fiscal Year 2003 to solve a common water supply problem impacting residents along Hydesville Road and adjoining areas in both Towns; and

WHEREAS, the Arcadia Town Board, by Resolution dated March 11, 2003, has authorized the Supervisor, the Town's Chief Executive Officer, to enter into a cooperation agreement with the Town of Palmyra; and

WHEREAS, the Palmyra Town Board, by Resolution dated February 27, 2003, has authorized the Supervisor, the Town's Chief Executive Officer, to enter into a cooperation agreement with the Town of Arcadia, so as to receive funds available to joint applicants under the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended.

NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED, that in consideration of the premises and the mutual agreements hereinafter set forth, the parties mutually agree as follows:

- That the Towns shall file a joint Fiscal Year 2003 application pursuant to the requirements of the Small Cities Community Development Block Grant Program.
- 2. That the Town of Arcadia is hereby designated the lead agency for legal

- and administrative purposes, as it relates to the grantor agency.
- 3. That neither of the Towns shall apply individually for any funding available under the
 - Fiscal Year 2003 Small Cities Community Development Block Grant Program.
- 4. That the Towns shall mutually agree to assist each other in the undertaking of eligible community development program activities and to comply with the rules and regulations governing the Small Cities Community Development Program.
- 5. That the Towns shall cooperate to provide said proposed public water supply system improvements for the mutual benefit of both municipalities.
- 6. That the Towns shall enter into such other agreements as are necessary to implement the understandings contained herein.
- 7. That the Towns shall cooperate in the preparation of any forms and reports required to comply with the Housing and Community Development Act, and shall sign such forms and reports as mandated by GOSC and/or HUD.
- 8. That the term of the Agreement shall be for the Fiscal 2003 Federal Program Year.
